## Unilateral Sanctions Against Russia and the International Rule of Law

The international response to Russia's unlawful invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 has once again brought to the fore the use of unilateral sanctions in international law. Recent scholarship has focussed mainly on the lawfulness of particular sanctions practices such as confiscation of state assets and secondary sanctions. But focus on these discrete issues has left other important questions unanswered. For instance, what is the relevance of the fact that recent practice is driven by a select group of states, and that that sanctions are imposed in response to certain violations of international law and not others? Is their increased use a sign of a concerning unilateralism or a threat to the rules-based order?

It is argued that we can begin to answer such questions by thinking in terms of the international rule of law. Through an enumeration of certain formal and substantive rule of law considerations, it is shown that that the triggering and implementation of sanctions with these considerations in mind can provide international legal subjects with weightier reasons for action. Ultimately, it is argued that our present system of collective security means that unilateral sanctions are inevitable, but the rule of law provides guidance on how to design and implement such sanctions in the most normatively desirable way.
