Lesson topic

This workshop aims to prepare students for participation in pre-moots of the Willem C. Vis International Commercial Arbitration Moot (Vis Moot), scheduled for spring 2025 (at the end of the 2024 academic year). Designed for aspiring international business lawyers, the course offers a unique opportunity to develop crucial skills in legal interpretation, persuasive English argumentation, and teamwork through a hands-on mock arbitration project.

The Vis Moot challenges students to tackle international commercial disputes through simulated arbitration proceedings. Teams represent parties as counsel in disputes related to international sale of goods, honing their skills in a competitive environment. Our workshop kicks off once the official Problem (a 50-page document in English) is released on 11 October 2024. Embracing a student-led seminar format, this course demands active participation both in and outside the classroom. Participants will dive deep into issue analysis, conduct thorough research, and draft compelling written arguments.

*This course is planned to be conducted using a combination of face-to-face and real-time remote classes, but the format may be changed based on participants' preferences.

**The first class will be held on Monday, 7 October, during the second period (10:40-12:10), and the second class will be on Tuesday, 15 October, during the second period (10:40-12:10). The schedule for the third and subsequent classes will be determined in consultation with the participants.

***Please note that this course does not aim for participation in the Vis Moot competition in Vienna and Hong Kong in spring 2025.

Lesson target

Upon completing the course, students should be able to (1) understand how arbitration proceeding proceeds, (2) understand and interpret the rules and laws concerning arbitration, (3) write documents properly and argue effectively in the proceedings, and (4) work with other team members efficiently and help each other effectively.

Evaluation method

- Contribution to the teamwork for written submissions (50%)
- Participation into the research and discussion (50%)

Evaluation baseline

Students should be able to:

- explain how arbitration proceeding proceeds.
- interpret the rules and laws concerning arbitration
- write documents properly and argue effectively in the proceedings
- cooperate with other team members efficiently

Notice (include info. on related class)

- Prior to taking this course, students are expected to check the schedule and keep enough time for participating in this project.
- Foreign language literature (especially in English) will be the main source material.
- There is a possibility that real-time classes using Zoom will become the standard format.
- As mentioned in the course description, active participation outside of class is expected.
- In the final stages of preparation for the international competition, there may be classes involving universities and practitioners from both within Japan and abroad.

Review: Recollect the discussion and consider how to proceed for the next session
